United Way of Florence County Community Needs Assessment

United Way of Florence County took a three-pronged approach to identify the most pressing needs in the community. Community members were able to provide input through community conversations and surveys. The process was conducted over a six-month period and identified three major and two secondary needs in Florence County.

Community Conversations

UWFC hosted community conversations modeled after the Harwood Institute "turning outward" approach.

These community conversations helped to ensure these voices were heard by providing a safe environment for people to share their aspirations for the community and the barriers they perceive to achieving them.

These 90-minute kitchen-table-style conversations took place across the county in **11** different locations and brought together over **100** community members from diverse backgrounds and beliefs to discuss various issues.

These conversations helped identify factors that impact our community's health, education, and financial stability.

Survey

The UWFC Community Survey was a multiple-question survey that addressed the respondent's characteristics, demographics, education, health, income, and self-sufficiency concerns.

These questions were a combination of multiplechoice, scaled, and open-ended response questions. The survey did not ask for any identifying information so we could provide privacy for our community to promote honest feedback.

The survey was distributed online via Survey Monkey by UWFC, key partners, companies, and donors. The survey was completed by **772** community members and providers over a six-month period.
